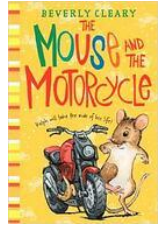
### Danny the Champion of the World by Roald Dahl

But one day, after wandering into a candy store and buying a piece of their best chocolate, John finds out that there might just be such a thing as too much chocolate...



### **Pip Bartlett's Guide to Magical Creatures by Maggie Stiefvater and Jackson Pearce**

Nine-year-old Pip has the unique ability to communicate with magical creatures—but no one believes her. Because of a Unicorn Incident at her school (it was an accident!), Pip is sent to spend the summer with her Aunt Emma at the Cloverton Clinic for Magical Creatures. At first, it's all fun, games, and chatting with Hobgrackles, but when Fuzzles appear and start bursting into flame at the worst possible places, Pip and her new friend Tomas must take action. Because if the mystery of the Fuzzles isn't solved soon, both magical and unmagical creatures are going to be in a lot of trouble.



### **The Strange Case of Origami Yoda by Tom Angleberger**

In this funny, uncannily wise portrait of the dynamics of a sixth-grade class and of the greatness that sometimes comes in unlikely packages, Dwight, a loser, talks to his classmates via an origami finger puppet of Yoda. If that weren't strange enough, the puppet is uncannily wise and prescient.
