CHOICE Activity (choose one):

1. Write a feature article (with a headline) that tells the story of the book as it might be found on the front page of a newspaper in the town where the story takes place.
2. Sketch a favorite part of the book—don't copy an existing illustration. Explain both why it is your favorite AND why it is central to the plot of your book.
3. Write a one to two sentence summary of each chapter and illustrate the sentence.
4. Make a GIANT bookmark for your book; draw a character on the front and give a summary of the book on the back of your "bookmark" after listing the title and author.
5. Write a poem—rhyming or free verse—and a minimum of twenty lines about the book you read.
6. Prepare a list of 15 to 20 questions for use in determining if other people have read the book carefully. Include the answers!
7. Write a diary as the main character would write it to explain the events of the story. Your diary must have at least five entries and at least one paragraph each.
8. Make a mobile showing pictures or symbols of happenings in the book. Include a written explanation of the importance of these objects to the overall plot of your book.
9. Make a crossword puzzle using ideas from your book. You must have at least 25 words and include a copy of the solved crossword puzzle, too.

10. Make a shoe box diorama of a scene from the book you read. Write a paragraph explaining the scene and its effect in the book.
